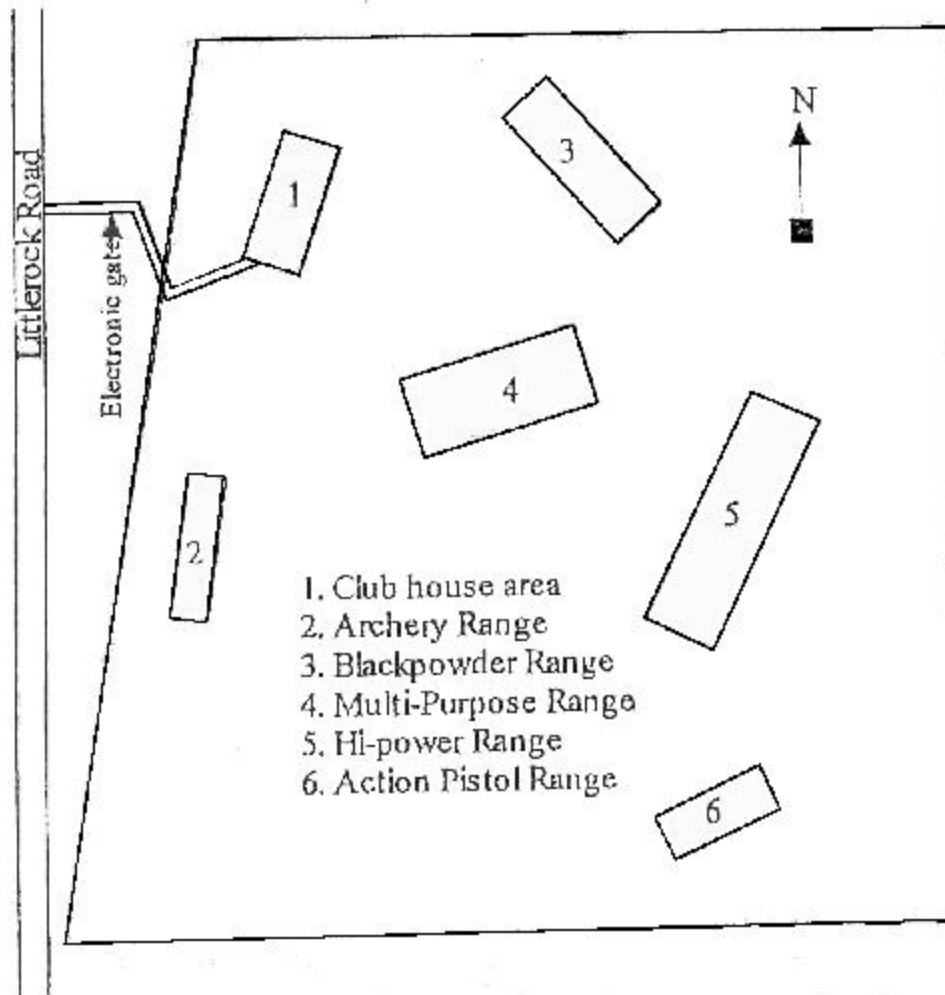

Welcome

We're happy that you are interested in our club. The purpose of this brochure is to familiarize you with the club, its principles and how it operates. Capitol City Rifle and Pistol Club (CCRP) is a private club offering a variety of shooting sports on indoor and outdoor ranges. It is dedicated through its by-laws to the encouragement of organized rifle, archery and pistol shooting in the community with a view toward better knowledge on safety, care of firearms and the essentials of good sportsmanship and the foundation of true patriotism.

Location and Access

CCRP is located on 140 acres of rolling, timber covered terrain along the Black River, 1½ miles south of Littlerock, Washington and about 12 miles southwest of Olympia. To reach the club from I-5: take exit 95, go west 3½ miles to Littlerock, turn left (South) and go 1½ miles on Littlerock Road, turn left at the club sign to enter the facility. An automated gate accessed by a member's electronic key card controls the entrance. The gate is open when any scheduled event is underway or when Member Orientation classes are scheduled. The following schematic shows the relative locations on our property of the clubhouse and the various ranges.



Membership

Membership is open to anyone of good character, not prohibited from owning firearms and sharing in the aims and goals of the club. Membership in the National Rifle Association is required and may be joined concurrently with joining CCRP. Membership orientation classes are held approximately 8 times a year either on Saturday at 10:00 AM or Wednesday at 7:00 PM. Membership fees, collected at the required New Member Orientation Course are:

- ? Annual Dues -- \$70.00
- ? Initiation Fee – \$80.00 (One time fee)
- ? Gate Card Deposit -- \$10.00
- ? Additional Adult members of the household may join for \$35.00 annual dues and no initiation fee.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annual to offset an assessment of \$80.00 per year. There are a wide variety of service opportunities available including service on the Board of Directors, committee membership, recruiting new members and maintenance and repair of ranges, grounds and facilities.

Club Operation

Operation of the CCRP is under the direction of the Board of Directors, elected from and by the membership. Monthly Board meetings are held, usually on the first Friday of each month and are open to members with voting by Board members only. Communication with members and the community is maintained by the club

website: www.ccrpclub.org and by the monthly newsletter, *The Plinker* which is available on the website or by direct mail to the member's home. Official meeting minutes, points of contact for club business, current range schedules, and news of past and coming events are provided through it.

Ranges and Disciplines Available

Ranges and disciplines available to members at CCRP include:

- ? **Indoor Range:** 50 foot range for organized shooting of .22 rimfire rifles and pistols as well as air rifles and archery events in a formal, controlled range setting.
- ? **George Stenson Multipurpose Range:** Pistol shooting at 25 and 60 yard ranges, rimfire rifles and pistols up to .22 Magnum up to 100 yards on formal targets and metallic silhouettes
- ? **Black Powder Range:** 25, 50, 75 and 100 yard ranges for Muzzle loading rifles, pistols and shotguns, rimfire rifles and pistols up to .22 Magnum.
- ? **Capitol City Bowmen Archery Field and 3-D Trail Ranges:** restricted to bows only. Additional group membership of \$10.00 yearly for full participation including copies of the monthly news letter, "The Shaft" and participation in work days and other CCB events.
- ? **High Power Range:** 25, 50, 100 & 200 yard ranges for all arms excluding .50 BMG
- ? **Steve May Action Pistol Range:** Action Pistol Targets on ranges from 25 to 100 yards. Individual access requires qualification to obtain a gate key. Cowboy Action events are held on this range.

Each range has a full schedule of events relating to its discipline or interest. In addition, comprehensive events are held on the Archery Range (Wooly Booger and State Match Events), Hunter Safety Training, and the fur trade era Rain-Dee-Voo. Camping is available for scheduled events for self contained RV's and for conventional and primitive tents. No hookups are available, however.

CCRP ranges are open daily, 8AM to 8PM for member's use with no fees other than as designated for scheduled events. Scheduled events set match fees from \$5.00 up, based on the course of fire. CCRP operates on a volunteer basis without paid range staff. Basic range safety practices are required and each member is responsible for the conduct of their family members or guest on the club premises. The goal of safety and range operation is that all projectiles impact directly into a designated berm. Range operations accepted range safety practices and are founded on:

The Five Universal Firearms Safety Rules

The goal of every gun or bow owner should be to live their lives free of any accidents, tragedies or other mishaps involving their guns or bows. These rules apply to ALL guns/bows and ALL situations!

1. Treat all guns as if they were loaded. At all times – at work, at home or on the firing range – treat all guns as if they are loaded. The only exception is when a gun is fully disassembled for cleaning or repair. Treat it as a loaded gun whenever it is reassembled and in a condition where it could fire.

2. Never allow a gun to point at anything you are not willing to shoot. At all times – at work, at home or on the firing range – always control what the muzzle points at. Before handling a firearm, identify a safe direction.

3. Keep your finger out of the trigger guard and off the trigger until ready to shoot. Keep your finger on the frame of the gun above the trigger until the sights are pointed at the target.

4. Be sure of your target and anything beyond. Positively identify your target and know what the bullet will strike if you miss the target or the bullet passes through the target. Consider the moral as well as legal aspects.

5. Keep all guns locked up and secured when not in use. Firearms should be unloaded and secured. Stolen guns provide weapons for criminal activity. Securing your guns protects those who are untrained in gun handling.
